A Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations (FDPIR)

REVISION 46 (01/01/18 –12/31/18)

The Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations (FDPIR) is a USDA program that provides commodity foods to low-income participants living on Indian reservations, and to American Indian households residing in designated areas near reservations. FDPIR is administered locally by Tribal agencies.

Budgetary units are potentially eligible to receive FDPIR benefits when they meet one of the following:

- Reside on an Indian reservation that administers an FDPIR
- Reside near an Indian reservation that administers an FDPIR and include at least one adult participant who is a recognized member of that reservations Tribe

Budgetary units may not receive both NA and FDPIR benefits in the same month. Before approving NA, FAA must verify whether a budgetary unit that is potentially eligible for FDPIR benefits is receiving FDPIR benefits.

Budgetary units approved for NA but receiving zero benefits are eligible to apply for and receive FDPIR benefits for that month.
